

CAP Anniversary

1 John 3:16-18 – Just Love

“This is how we know what love is: Jesus Christ laid down his life for us.” (1John 3:16)

This morning we are celebrating the first anniversary of our CAP (Christians Against Poverty) ministry. Our Debt Centre Manager, Helen Diplock, will give us an update on some of the encouraging things that have happened in the last year and what we hope to see happening as we go forward.

As we do so we'll reflect on what the Bible teaches us about love. The neurologist and psychiatrist, Dr Karl Stern, claims that many psychological and emotional problems would be alleviated if two basic human needs are met - the need to receive love and the need to give love.

John, the disciple of Jesus, would not have been surprised. In his first letter he tells us how we can receive God's love ourselves and how we can become channels for that love to flow into the world. We'll consider those things together, giving thanks for God's great love and recommitting ourselves to live lives of love for the honour and praise of Jesus Christ.

Please remember that you only have to book in advance for a seat if you want to be socially distanced. Your seat will then be reserved.



a passion for life

“But in your hearts revere Christ as Lord. Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have. But do this with gentleness and respect.” 1 Peter 3:15

This Sunday afternoon sees the start of our *A Passion for Life* training sessions.

This week we will be focusing on “Making meaningful connections”, with the aim of equipping us to be intentional about talking naturally to others about our faith and the hope we have in Jesus.

The session consists of a video presentation, discussion and prayer. We hope as many of you as possible will be able to join us.

If you are unable to make it this week, then here is a link to the video and a few questions for you to consider once you have watched it:

- List the people you already have a natural connection with. Are there people you see regularly that you could be more intentional about getting to know e.g. parents at the school gate, dog walkers etc.?
- Think about the ways in which you have shown hospitality and acts of kindness in the past. Have these led to opportunities to share the reason for the hope you have? If not, how could you do things differently?
- Make a list of people who you think would be encouraged if you offered them some hospitality. Make a plan to invite them soon.
- Think of ways in which we as a church can use our natural connections in the community to build friendships and show love and hospitality with the aim of introducing people to Christ? How can we use what we already do?

Finally, spend some time in prayer:

- Thank God for those who loved and shared the gospel with you.
- Ask God to help you to open your eyes to see those He has put around you and to have the opportunity to get to know them better and share your life with them.
- Ask God to help you to speak more naturally about your faith with everyone.

VBC CHOIR - THE BACKGROUND

Many thanks also to Linda Smith, Averil Huggins, Joyce Kirkman, Mary Wain and non-VBC people Graeme Bunn (husband of Rose McKendrick) and Wes Game, for their contributions and help in identifying the faces - and of course, to Mary for starting this all up in the first place. Over to Keren Newth for some background to the picture.



My grandfather, Leslie Newth, was an elder at the original Victoria Baptist church building in Victoria Drive & continued in that role once the venue had moved to Eldon Road, so we've had associations as a family with VBC since the 60's (my first service at Victoria was when I was a few weeks old). My parents & I moved to Eastbourne in 1979, and my grandparents came to live with us. Rev. George Cumming (VBC Minister at that time) already knew us because we had visited my grandparents over the years, & he was aware that my mother had trained gospel choirs in Essex for many years. Mum had also been behind training choirs for many performances of the popular 1970's Christian Musicals by American singer/songwriters Jimmy & Carol Owens - 'Come Together' & 'If my people', which were used as celebrations of outreach all around Suffolk & Essex.

There was an interdenominational Christian outreach in Eastbourne coming up - 'Mission 80' - & Mr Cumming asked my mother if she would train a choir at Victoria Baptist to minister at the nightly Mission. Due to the fact that the church didn't have enough voices, mum suggested that they open it up to other folk, & the choir became an interdenominational choir from many churches in the town, including Frenchgate Chapel, the Elim church, Holy Trinity Church, and The Salvation Army. My mother also suggested that the choir rehearse the American musical 'Alleluia', by Bill & Gloria Gaither and many members from VBC chose to join the throng. This began our ministry in leading worship in the town for the next 30+ years.

Although Alleluia was only shared over two nights at VBC, the choir was also asked to minister with the same musical at churches in Seaford and Bexhill. In fact, after the Mission was over, George Cumming asked mum to form a worship group at VBC, but she wasn't sure that the church family was quite ready for that style of worship at that time, so she reluctantly declined. We were then asked to form a worship group elsewhere in the town.

I am able to tell you that the photograph was taken & printed in the Eastbourne Herald, with the accompanying article (see next page for article).

PRAYER DIARY: 20TH – 26TH SEPTEMBER

Therefore do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own. *Matthew 6:34*

Monday Reflect on the verse above remembering that God's grace is sufficient for you, but it's sufficiency is for one day at a time. No one said it would be easy to live by faith, especially in these present times, but ask the Holy Spirit to bless you and others as we put our faith in God's grace.

Tuesday Please pray for our school children and students facing more uncertainty, as we move into autumn, over future school lockdowns as coronavirus rates rise. Pray that God will guide our national church leaders to call for the nation to pray for God to guide the world out of this pandemic as we honour Him.

Wednesday Please pray for the migrant crisis as the French and British governments struggle to decide how to deal with a chaotic situation while trying to maintain acceptable care for human life. Give thanks that we live in this lovely country and be humbled by the knowledge that it is by God's grace that we are not migrants.

Thursday Heavenly Father, we pray for our literal neighbours, the ones who live right next door to us. We may rarely speak to them or even see them much, but You have placed us in the road we live in for the purpose of witnessing to You. Give us opportunities to reach out to them with the gospel and bless our constant prayers for them in Jesus name.

Friday Lord, we pray for the autumn Climate Change Conference. No doubt the discussions will be challenging as the world has to learn to work together for the common good. FUEL FOR PRAYER

MIRACLES OF JESUS

JESUS' - VICTOR OVER THE POWERS OF EVIL – MARK 1:23 – 28

When Mark begins his account of Jesus' public ministry, he does not mention the water into wine miracle at Cana, but what happens in the Sabbath synagogue service in Capernaum.

“And they went into Capernaum - Jesus entered the synagogue and was teaching. And they were astonished at His teaching, for He taught them as one who had authority and not as the scribes.”

Capernaum was a lakeside town on the northern shore of the Sea of Galilee about 25 miles from Jesus' home town of Nazareth. It boasted of a harbour, a customs' post and a detachment of Roman soldiers – population was about 10,000 and the home town of the men Jesus had called His disciples, including Peter, Andrew, James, John and Matthew.

Jesus was a faithful Jew, attending a synagogue on the Sabbath. Services followed an order of elements eg recitation of prayers, readings, followed by a sermon based on the Scriptures – today a special speaker – Jesus. Mark gives us a clue. Mark 1 : 14 – 15 “Jesus came into Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God. ‘The time is fulfilled – the Kingdom of God is at hand – repent and believe the gospel.’”

What a reaction to this dynamic preacher! They were astonished at His teaching, for He taught as one who had authority, so different from the scribes (v22). One writer describes Jesus' teaching as powerful and penetrating. He was not merely speaking about God. He was speaking from Him and for Him.

Even demons submit!

There was in the synagogue a man with an unclean spirit who cried out, “What have You to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have You come to destroy us? I know who You are - the Holy One of God.” But Jesus rebuked him. “Be silent and come out of him. The unclean spirit convulsed him and, crying out with a loud voice, came out of him.”

What an amazed congregation – not only a wonderful teacher – with authority. He even commands the unclean spirits and they obey Him.

I wonder how many services – where this man sat quietly – worshipping – but today was very special? His cry for help, cured by the Master Preacher – what a miracle! Even today, Jesus can heal the evil spirits and restore sanity to those suffering maybe the effect of drugs or alcohol. Jesus can heal!

Fun in the sun!

Well over 100 people from VBC and friends attended last Saturday's "Welcome Back" barbecue here in the garden area. Postponed from the end of June owing to the lockdown being extended, it was great to be able to mingle relatively safely in the open air and catch up with people we hadn't seen for many months.
